"In the beginning, I wasn't really deliberate about my career. I was in my groove in manufacturing engineering and supply chain management. Then, I was thrown a curve ball to go into HR. I was scared about making such a big change because I was "in my lane", but really it was a gift.

"Identifying the advantages of that new position can help motivate you to take those scary leaps. For me, some of them were:

- Admiring the leader of the new role.
- Recognizing the new skill sets I would acquire.
- Learning more about how the company worked.

"It's important to remember that a career change decision should <u>not</u> be made from frustration or emotion. It should come from clarity, from knowing your why.

"Ultimately, it's about **being intentional with your career**. Even after 28 years at SLB, where I was very happy, I had to ask myself, 'Am I challenged enough?'
